Rotary Centre for the Arts' Out & Proud Film Festival Returns for Third Year

Innovative films focus on the lives and experiences of LGBTQI2S+ people

(**Kelowna, B.C.**) – The Rotary Centre for the Arts today announces the full lineup of its third annual Out & Proud Film Festival. Set to take place September 20, 21, and 22, Out & Proud 2021 offers an exciting lineup of films for the Okanagan community that explore the lives and experiences of diverse LGBTQI2S+ people.

Colleen Fitzpatrick, Executive Director of the Rotary Centre for the Arts, says, "We're thrilled to once again be hosting the Out & Proud Film Festival. This year's films showcase stories from all corners of the LGBTQI2S+ community, and highlight the remarkable variety of contemporary queer cinema."

The festival kicks off on September 20th with a screening of Mark Kenneth Woods and Michael Yerxa's, *Two Soft Things, Two Hard Things,* a documentary that examines the efforts of queer Indigenous youth in Nunavut to understand sexuality, identity, and family from a distinctly Inuit perspective.

Says Elana Bizovie, lead coordinator of Out & Proud 2021, "Two Soft Things, Two Hard Things is a beautiful film that helps us understand how histories of colonization and contemporary efforts at decolonization shape ideas of gender and sexuality." Following the film, patrons will be treated to a Talk Back session focused on how Indigenous understandings of gender expression and identity contribute to the work of decolonizing the gender binary.

On September 21 and 22, the festival continues with a unique lineup of documentaries, features, and experimental shorts. "We're especially excited to feature two double bills this year," says Bizovie. On September 21, following a feature screening of Paul Émile d'Entremont's documentary *Standing on the Line*, festivalgoers can take in a pair of shorts by Kelowna-based writer and filmmaker Michael V. Smith (*The Hookup*) and Michèle Pearson Clarke (*Handmade Mountain*). "The LGBTQI2S+ community is big, diverse, and always evolving. By featuring films of all styles and forms, Out & Proud tries to reflect that diversity."

More information on the Out & Proud Film Festival, including a complete program of films and ticketing details, can be found on the <u>Rotary Centre for the Arts website</u>. Tickets are available for individual films, but patrons can also purchase a festival pass for \$25.00. Festival passes provide access to all screenings *except* Out & Proud's online offering, *Fanny: The Right to Rock* (this event ticketed separately).
